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Course Description

This course is an examination of the people and cultures from the past to the present throughout the world. Major emphasis is placed on Europe; Africa, Asia, and the Modern Era. This course will include analyzing the elements of culture, religion, government, geography, music from around the world, and experiencing food from many cultures. In addition to meeting the goals of the Global Studies curriculum, the student will complete a variety of assignments to build a base of skills and knowledge necessary to perform on an advanced level. Global Studies Honors will also focus on critical reading, writing, and synthesis of content at an advanced level in preparation for the various required college courses at most universities.
